FARMING AND DISCIPLESHIP

The cabbage and onion planted last term was enjoyed by all our families this term and new vegetable seeds were planted in their place. In the month of October it is the time of year to prepare fields for planting maize, the staple food source in Zambia. November is planting season — once there has been some signs of the rain starting. We have used a significant portion of our field for Maize however the area is smaller than last year due to a new road we are in the process of building for access to our site.

Every Friday we have continued to see approximately half of our guardians in the field, hoeing, weeding, planting, watering, mulching or harvesting. They are enjoying both working together and taking produce home at the end.

It is always wonderful to see such joy on their faces and hear them laughing together as they work. We are beginning to see and hear that the way they tend to the Arise field is what they are now doing in their own fields at home. We are all now trusting God to supply the rain needed.
